Martin John Flanagan and Marie Therese Talbot were married on 5/22/1922 at Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago (the same church where Marie's parents Edward H. Talbot and Kittie A. Rooney were married in 1880). Martin was 33 and Marie was 31 years old.

Martin was the son of Patrick J. Flanagan and Anna Kane. He was born in Chicago on 11/7/1888 and was baptized at Holy Family Church in the Near West Side neighborhood. The Flanagan family lived in the McKinley neighborhood for most of Martin's life prior to World War I.

Marie was born on 6/28/1890 in the Grand Boulevard neighborhood of Chicago. The family lived with Edward's parents Thomas and Hannah Talbot at 4132 S. Wabash. They were parishioners of St. Elizabeth Church where Marie was baptized, which was located on the corner of their block.

Kittie (Rooney) Talbot passed away on 9/19/1899 when Marie was nine years old. The Talbot family was living in the Woodlawn neighborhood. Records show that Marie was placed into a girls school in Joliet after her mother's death and later rejoined her father Edward. The exact chronology is unclear for how long she remained at the school or whether she was living with other relatives during this time period.

Patrick Flanagan passed away on 11/11/1908 when Martin was 20 years old. The Flanagan family was living at 3525 S. Paulina in McKinley Park. Edward H. Talbot passed away two months earlier on 8/10/1908 when Marie was 18 years old. The Talbot family was living at 6555 S. Green in the Englewood neighborhood.

Martin Flanagan spent most of his career working as a brick maker. He primarily lived with his mother Anna (Kane) Flanagan until his marriage to Marie Talbot, but briefly had lived closer to his employment. Martin served with the 23rd Engineers (Wagon Company 1) in France during World War I. The 23rd Engineers were known as the road builders of the American Expeditionary Forces. He was promoted from Private 1st Class at the end of the war while still in France.

Marie Talbot was seeking employment in the fashion industry as a dressmaker at the time of her father's death in 1908. Her maternal grandparents William and Julia Rooney were prominent early settlers of Chicago dating back to 1835. William Rooney built a family residence at 43 E. Division in the Gold Coast neighborhood along with multiple commercial buildings Downtown after the 1871 Chicago Fire. The Talbot family briefly lived in the William Rooney house prior to Marie's birth and across the street when she was about seven years old. When her father Edward passed away, Marie lived with her maternal uncle John Rooney who ran a milk business in the Bridgeport neighborhood at 2970 S. Archer, a four-flat that he had built. Marie remained with her uncle and cousins for at least 14 years until her marriage in 1922. John Rooney still owned a portion of William Rooney's farm in present-day Mt. Prospect during the time that Marie lived with the family in Bridgeport. He also owned a business on 31st and Canal that was acquired from Marie's parents Edward and Kittie Talbot before she was born.

After Edward Talbot's death, Marie changed professions and worked as a retail cashier in various local businesses. At one point, Marie Talbot worked as a cashier on the corner of 35th and Paulina, just a few buildings from the Flanagan family residence. Her Rooney cousins were active in politics and she assisted their later campaigns. One cousin Thomas A. Rooney was elected alderman and his brother John J. Rooney was a long-serving judge of the old Chicago Municipal Court rising to the status of Chief Justice. Two other brothers (Austin and Walter) were also attorneys with their own law practice Downtown.

After their marriage in 1922, Martin and Marie lived in the Brighton Park and Gage Park neighborhoods before returning to Bridgeport in the late 1920s. They remained in Bridgeport for the remainder of their lives.

Their daughter Marie C. Flanagan married Michael S. Byczek at St. Bridget's in Bridgeport in 1950. They are Michael E. Byczek's grandparents.

Martin J. Flanagan passed away on 10/22/1947 while the family lived at 2888 S. Archer. He was buried with his parents in the Flanagan family plot at Mt. Olivet Cemetery in Chicago.

Marie (Talbot) Flanagan passed away on 2/14/1957 while living with her daughter Marie Byczek at 2520 S. Stark in Bridgeport. She was buried with her parents and grandparents in the Thomas and Hannah Talbot family plot at Calvary Cemetery in Evanston, IL. Marie is also buried with her daughter Anna.

Both funerals for Martin and Marie Flanagan were held at St. Bridget's on Archer Ave in Bridgeport. It is the same church where their daughter Marie Flanagan married Michael S. Byczek in 1950, their grandson Michael M. Byczek was baptized in 1951, and great-grandson Michael E. Byczek was baptized in 1980.

The Martin and Marie Flanagan family have a unique connection to Bonfield Street in the Bridgeport neighborhood.

Marie (Talbot) Flanagan filed a delayed birth certificate for her daughter Marie in 1943 while the family lived at 2856 S. Archer. The building was located on Archer at the T-intersection with Bonfield. When Martin Flanagan passed away in 1947, the family lived at 2888 S. Archer, which was in a block of buildings on the corner of Archer and Bonfield (the street is offset north and south of Archer). Their daughter Marie and son-in-law Michael S. Byczek lived at 2917 S. Bonfield after the wedding in 1950, where their eldest child Michael M. Byczek was born. The family moved next door at 2921 S. Bonfield St. where they resided for the next few years. Marie (Talbot) Flanagan lived with her daughter's family on Bonfield. Michael M. Byczek returned to Bonfield Street in 1979 when he and his wife Betty Byczek purchased a two-flat located at 2939 S. Bonfield, where their children Michael E. Byczek and Katherine S. Byczek were born. Michael S. and Marie Byczek lived in the building during the 1980s and 1990s. As of 2025, Michael M. and Betty Byczek still reside in the same building after 46 years along with their son Michael E. Byczek.

Three consecutive generations of the Flanagan-Byczek family have a Bonfield Street birth certificate. Marie (Talbot) Flanagan filed the delayed birth certificate for her daughter Marie in 1943 while living at 2856 S. Archer, at the intersection of Archer and Bonfield. The address for her grandson Michael M. Byczek's birth certificate was 2917 S. Bonfield in 1951. Her great-grandson Michael E. Byczek's birth certificate was 2939 S. Bonfield in 1980. All four generations have lived within one-half block of Archer and Bonfield at some point between the early 1940s and present-day.









Marie Talbot is listed as being born in June 1890, which is correct.

However, her parents are both listed as born in Ireland, but her mother was born in Illinois and father in Massachusetts.

Marie's father is living alone with his mother Hannah at 4132 Wabash for the census.

Marie's brother Frank is missing from the census.

1910 2970 Archer living with her uncle John Rooney

Edward died two years earlier

Marie listed as a casher at a market. Her parents are both listed as born in Illinois, but her father was born in Massachusetts.

1920 2970 Archer living with her uncle John Rooney (Marie's name spelled Talbert)

Marie working as cashier in butcher shop

She is listed as 24 years old (really 29), unless 4 is a 9 (slightly illegible)

Both of her parents are listed as born in New York, but that is where John Rooney was born.

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16 17 Mother Alfred Moes, a well-known Franciscan sister for having laid the foundation for the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota, founded St. Francis Academy in 1869 in a small stone convent on Broadway and Division streets. In 1882, SFA moved to a new building on Plainfield Avenue, and a new wing at Taylor Street was completed in 1915. Prior to this date, most students were boarders. The curriculum offered six specific courses of study, while English, mathematics, Latin and religion, of course, were the required subjects.

A Brief History of the Joliet Franciscans



Joliet Franciscans have lived the challenge and dream given to St. Francis of Assisi by Jesus, "Rebuild my Church," since our founding in Joliet in 1865 by Mother Alfred Moes with help from her spiritual advisor, Father Pamfilo da Magliano, OFM. During the young Congregation's first 11 growth-filled years, Sisters were sent to 36 different missions in Illinois, Missouri, Tennessee, Wisconsin and Ohio. The Sisters taught children in parish schools and played integral parts in the parish life of the Catholic Church as it grew strong roots in America.

At home in Joliet, these first Illinois Franciscans built a motherhouse, took in orphans and boarding students, staffed parish schools, and welcomed new members into their novitiate. They used precious resources to establish a variety of ministries and built a number of Catholic institutions that continue to serve the people of Joliet.

Joliet Franciscans Website (saved in 2020)

The Joliet Franciscan Sisters opened St. Francis Academy in 1869 as an all-girls school. The academy was founded in a small stone building convent by Mother Mary Alfred Moes, who later would help found the Mayo Clinic. In 1923, the school moved to the campus of the University of St. Francis, which had opened in 1920. In 1956, the school moved to the building at 1200 N. Larkin, which is the current site of JCA.


The Motherhouse, originally home to the university's founders, the Sisters of St. Francis of Mary Immaculate, is now home to the Presidents Office, Advancement offices, the Welcome Center, Undergraduate admissions, the student center, and the Leach College of Nursing classrooms, skills laboratories, and including a state-of-the-art Simlab.

Central to campus life is St. Joseph Chapel in the Motherhouse, which welcomes the Sisters of St. Francis each Founders' Day in September. University Ministry offices are also within the Motherhouse.

Built in 1881, the expansive Motherhouse also houses a state of the art board room for all university board meetings.
